

Straw Bale Gardening by Ann-Laurie Fratticcioli

Many friends are asking me about the Straw Bale Garden that Bob and I began doing in 2017 so I thought it would be easier if I jotted down some quick notes. There is a plethora of information online but my resource of choice is Joel Karsten, author of <u>Straw Bale Gardens</u>, <u>Straw Bale Gardens</u> Complete and <u>Straw Bale Solutions</u>. You'll have many more questions than what I've addressed below so I encourage you to go online and start at Joel's website <u>www.StrawBaleGardens.com</u> and his <u>Learn to Grow a Straw Bale Garden Facebook Group</u>.

As stated by Joel Karsten on his website www.strawbalegardens.com, "Straw Bale Gardening is simply a different type of container gardening. The main difference is that the container is actually the straw bale itself, held together with two or three strings, the outside crust of the bale serves as the container. Once the straw inside the bale begins to decompose, the straw becomes "conditioned" and ready to plant. The step by step process of conditioning creates an extraordinarily productive, warm, moist and nutrient rich rooting environment for young seedlings. Getting the straw bales conditioned is an essential part of the process, and should be started approximately two weeks prior to the target planting date in your area. This planting date varies greatly depending on where you are in the world but this gardening technique works anywhere in the world for seasonal spring/summer or for winter gardens."

Straw NOT Hay

2-String Bales - 18" x 36". They should to be cut side up, with the strings around the sides.

We placed landscape fabric down under the entire garden area and then put mulch between the rows of bales. They say you don't have to put fabric under the bales because the sun won't be hitting the ground, therefore no weeds will grow. I err on the side of caution and do it anyway. I also don't listen to everything I'm told to do! Whatever you do decide to use, make sure it is permeable so water can get through. Another suggestion is to have at least 5 feet between the rows of bales.

Conditioning - (See the Straw Bale Conditioning Quick Chart on the Back)

On Days 1, 3 & 5 you'll evenly sprinkle a 1/2 cup of a nitrogen-rich lawn fertilizer on each bale. 30-10-10 is what we've used in the past. Days 7 & 8 you'll sprinkle just a 1/4 cup. On Day 10 you'll sprinkle 1 cup of 10-10-10 lawn fertilizer. Day 11 you skip. Make sure there is no herbicide (weed killer) in the fertilizers. Bales are watered each day but you don't have to water on a day if there is a good rain. About 1 gallon of water per bale is all you need. Condition the bales rain or shine.

Planting

Day 12 begin planting. A few years we set-up a soaker hose and put it on a timer. Last year I just watered everyday because we were stuck home. Depending on what you'll be growing, you will probably need some posts and wire to create a trellis for the plant vines. Any trellis and/or soaker hoses should be done prior to planting. If you don't plant right on Day 12 don't worry about it, just be sure to keep the bales moist until planting.

When you do plant, don't make the same mistake as I always do and over plant. I tend to put far too many plants in each bale and then there are more veggies than we know what to do with. I also put a bit of potting mix around each plant I place in the bales but you don't have to. Another option is to place about a half inch to an inch of potting or planting mix (don't use soil from the yard because you'll introduce weeds) on the tops of the bales and just stick seeds in.
